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
Pisgah's Irby named top archer

Saint Studios Films: Big Dreams, Small Town, and a Dash of Movie Magic

Nestled in the charming town of Pelahatchie, Mississippi—where the tea is sweet and the dreams are sweeter—Saint Studios Films, LLC is proving that you don't need a Hollywood zip code to make movie magic. Since its official rebranding in 2008, the independent film company has grown under the creative vision of its founder, Curtis Everitt, who affectionately refers to it as "the community theater of independent film production."

Everitt's journey into filmmaking started not with a camera, but with a dream of being on screen. "I used to want to be an actor," he said. "But then I discovered actors have very little control over the final product. That didn't sit right with me—so I decided to get behind the camera and call the shots. Literally."

"For us, those miracles are pre-production, production, and post-production. If you can pull all three off, you're basically a saint in my book."

Over the years, Saint Studios has rolled out an eclectic mix of filmsfrom the suspenseful Dr. S, to the charmingly peculiar Bird's Eye, the feel-good comedy Just Act Cool, the nostalgic Fire Summer, and the sci-fi mind-bender Solar Eclipse. Each film is a labor of love, crafted with a unique blend of imagination, determination, and the occasional caffeine-fueled editing session.

"I like to give actors roles they



wouldn't normally get to play," Everitt said. "When someone reaches out wanting to work with me, the first thing I ask is, 'What's your dream role?' Then I do my best to make it happen. We're dreamers around here—dreamers with a camera and a deadline."

Though he once dabbled in wedding videography, Everitt has since hung up his bouquet-filming boots. "After my divorce, the thrill of filming weddings kind of faded," he said with a chuckle. "Now I focus on the stories I really want to tell—the ones that keep me up at night, in a good way."

In Pelahatchie, where neighbors are friends and creativity grows like wild honeysuckle, Curtis Everitt and Saint Studios Films are keeping the independent film spirit alive—one dream, one camera, and one miracle at a time.

Searching for financial advice? You might just find the best advisor at your local school. These students elevated their learning to new heights, earning top honors in the Spring 2025 Mississippi Stock Market Game (SMG). Students from East Rankin Academy, coached by Gary Harris, were named First Place winners in the High School Division of the Mississippi Stock Market Game (SMG).

ERA seniors Truitt Lewis (from Brandon), Gabe Nutt (from Morton), and Jonathan Soto (from Forest) captured the top position among 542 teams from public and private schools across the State of Mississippi. The winning team's portfolio outperformed the S&P 500 by 23.05%.

"I'm very proud of Truitt, Gabe, and Jonathan on rising to the top spot against so many teams from around the state. To my knowledge, this is the first team from East Rankin to garner the 1st place designation in more than 30 years," Harris said. "I'm also proud of all our teams

who learned so much about a difficult sector of the financial arena. We also had three other teams finish in the Top 100."

The Stock Market Game is an educational simulation that allows participants to experience the dynamics of the market in a risk-free environment. The game is used in Mississippi 4th-12th grade classrooms as part of investment education. Through this interactive experience, players learn about investment strategies, risk management, and the factors influencing stock prices. It is not only

a tool for teaching financial literacy but also fosters critical thinking and decision-making skills in a dynamic and engaging way. The benefits of students playing are the following:

- Financial Literacy: It provides an opportunity for students to learn about finance, investing, and the stock market in a practical and hands-on way. They can learn key concepts such as stocks, bonds, diversification, risk management, and the impact of economic events on markets.
- Critical Thinking: Managing a

virtual portfolio encourages students to analyze information, make decisions, and evaluate the consequences of their actions. They must research companies, industries, and economic trends to make informed investment choices.

- Risk Management: Through simulated trading, students can learn how to assess and manage risks. They can experiment with different investment strategies and understand the relationship between risk and return.
- Math and Analytical Skills: Tracking stock prices, calculating returns, and analyzing financial data help students strengthen their math skills and analytical abilities. They may also develop proficiency in using spreadsheets and financial analysis tools.
- Decision-Making Skills: Investing in the stock market game requires students to make decisions under uncertainty and deal with the consequences of their choices. This helps them develop decision-making skills and learn from both successes and failures.

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Defending your home with fire ant control lawn

Fire ants are the most common insect pests of home lawns. They occur in nearly every lawn in Mississippi. Even if you can

achieve a totally fire ant free yard, it probably won't stay that way for long, because newly mated fire ant queens will quickly recolonize it. New colonies seem to thrive in areas that are free of other competing colonies. Fire ant control can be an ongoing battle, but there are steps you can take to keep your yard relatively free of fire ants.

1) Granular Baits: The easiest, cheapest, and most effective way to control fire ants is to use baits. Learn to use baits properly and preventively and the number of fire ants in your yard can be reduced by 80 to 90 percent. The key to success with baits is applying them as broadcast treatments instead of treating only individual mounds. When properly applied, granular fire ant baits are low cost, quick and easy to apply, they are safe to children and pets, and give up to 80% control. Baits are "fire ant-edible" granules that contain low doses of slow acting insecticides or insect growth disruptors.

It may take two to six weeks to see the full benefits of a bait. Early spring is the best time to apply fire ant baits because fire ants are actively foraging for food at this time of year. If you are just going to treat one time of year, do it in the spring. But you can improve control by treating in midsummer and a third time in the fall. A rule of thumb is to broadcast a granular bait over your yard three to four times a year - around Easter, around Independence Day, and around Labor Day - and you should not have very many fire ants in your yard.

2) Dry Mound Treatments: Can't wait a few weeks for a bait to control that big mound

by the edge of the patio? A dry mound treatment is the most convenient way to kill fire ant mounds. Keep a can of dry mound treatments on hand to spot treat the mound you see in your yard. As you find fire ant mounds, just sprinkle the labeled amount of the product on the mound and walk away. The use of a combi-

nation of granular baits and dry mound treatments are very effective in controlling fire ants.

3) Liquid Mound Drenches: This is the fastest way to kill individual fire ant mounds, but they are the most time consuming to mix and apply. Use a watering can to mix and apply liquid drenches. Just mix the specific amount of insecticide in water and pour over the mound. The key to success with liquid drenches is to use enough liquid to thoroughly soak the mound. Depending on the size of the mound, it could range from 1 to 2 gallons of mixed drench.

Begin by applying about 1/4 of the total volume to a 10-12 inch band around the outside of the mound. This will help prevent the queen from escaping through those underground foraging tunnels and improves control of workers. Then apply the rest of the drench directly to the mound. Failing to use enough drench to thoroughly soak fire ants.

4) Broadcast Insecticide Treatments: Broadcast insecticide treatments are contact insecticides that are applied over the entire lawn. These are generally more time consuming and more costly than baits. These are used more in highly managed areas such as athletic fields and golf courses, than home lawns. Broadcast insecticide treatments may be formulated as liquids, which are mixed according to label instructions and then sprayed over the lawn areas, or as granular treatments, which are spread over the lawn areas using an appropriate spreader.

Don't get granular insecticides and granular baits confused. Baits are impregnated with oil or some other food substance and a small amount of slow-acting insecticide. Worker ants actively collect the bait granules and carry them back to the colony. Granular insecticides are simply granules that are impregnated with insecticide. These are not attractive to ants. Instead, the insecticide in the granules moves into the soil and controls foraging ants and newly settled queens by contact activity. Obtaining uniform coverage is more important when applying broadcast insecticide granules than when applying granular baits.

One benefit of applying insecticides used as broadcasts treatments for fire ants is the insecticides also control other lawn pests, such as chinch bugs, white grubs, and mole crickets. Choose the right insecticide and you can control mole crickets, fire ants, and white grubs. Before purchasing a broadcast insecticide, read the label carefully to be sure that the insecticide you choose controls the particular group of pests you need to control.

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- Real-World Application: The stock market game provides a simulated environment that mirrors real-world investing, allowing students to apply theoretical knowledge to practical situations. - Teamwork and Collaboration: Some versions of the stock market game involve team-based competitions, fostering teamwork, collaboration, and communication skills as students work together to manage their portfolios and achieve investment goals.
- Long-Term Perspective: Students learn the importance of longterm investing and the benefits of patience and discipline in achieving financial goals. They can see how compound interest works overtime and understand the power of staying invested for the long haul.


"The simulation is one of the most effective learning tools available about the free enterprise system for students in grades 4-12," stated

Selena Swartzfager, President of the MS Council on Economic Education. The program enables teams of students to invest a hypothetical \$100,000 in the stock market over a 13-week period. Winners are determined on the percentage return above or below S&P 500 growth.

"Last year, we had a 94% increase in student participation with a total of 6,746 students. students participating in the Mississippi Stock Market Game, and this year we are experiencing another year of growth, Swartzfager said, "This tells you how popular and effective this program is in the classroom. Students in all Mississippi schools should have the opportunity to learn about investing for their future. All it takes is a willing teacher to implement the program in the classroom."

MCEE will award prizes to each first, second, and third place team from each division during a Stock Market Game awards ceremony held at Jackson State University on Friday, May 9, 2025.

Pelahatchie March Public Hearing Summary: The Pelahatchie Mayor and Board of Aldermen held a public hearing to gather public input on several zoning and ordinance-related matters on March 31, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. The city attorney was not present in person

for this meeting (only on phone).

New Business:

- 1. Rezoning Request Kenneth Martin (Highway 43 North): Kenneth Martin requested that two residential lots on Highway 43 North be rezoned to commercial zoning. Martin was asked to return to the next regular board meeting for consideration and a formal vote.
- 2. Rezoning Request Luke Shivers (North Avenue): Luke Shivers was not present for the hearing. His request sought to rezone property on North Avenue from R-1 to High Density Residential for the purpose of constructing a future apartment complex within city limits. Due to his absence, no action was taken.
- 3. Ordinance Amendment Heritage District: The board discussed adding language to the Heritage District ordinance that would specifically ban liquor stores. David Gray's name was called multiple times, but it was announced that he was not present. Joe Lane Kelly, a local businessman, expressed his opposition to this amendment, stating that it would block him from building a liquor store in the Heritage District.

4. Special Conditional Use Permit Request – **Joe Lane Kelly:** Joe Lane Kelly submitted a request for a special conditional use permit to open a liquor store in the Heritage District. The matter was left for further discussion and action at the April 7 regular board meeting.

Pelahatchie April 2025 Board Meeting Summary: The Board of Aldermen for the Town of Pelahatchie held its regular monthly meeting on Monday, April 7, 2025, at Town Hall. Mayor Karl VanHorn called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m., followed by the Invocation by Alderman Jones and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call: All five members of the Board were present: Aldermen Diane Hill, Sandra Harvey, Margie Warren, Eddie Jones, and James Harrell.

Residents and Visitors' Business: An update from the Pelahatchie Public Library was listed on the agenda; however, no representative was present to deliver the update.

New Business:

- **1. Approval of March 3, 2025, Meeting Minutes:** Motion was made by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman Diane Hill. The motion passed unanimously.





Pelahatchie High School students win weightlifting championship





PHS celebrates National Librarian Day







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
PHS student feature: two positive office referrals

Pastor's Perspective: What are you expecting from Easter?

When the calendar turns to May, there's a lot of expectation and anticipation related to summer being just around the corner.

There's the anticipation of school letting out for a couple of months. And, whether you like it or not, there's always the anticipation of the hot and sticky Mississippi summer weather. Perhaps there's also the anticipation of a summer holiday to get away and relax for a few days. But as I anticipate each of these summer traditions, I currently find myself still reflecting on Easter, or more specifically, the resurrection of King Jesus. I hope that each of you were able to enjoy a meaningful Easter or Resurrection Day celebration. I hope your experience was one full of the worship of Jesus and also the tremendous hope that only the resurrection can bring you. As I continue to reflect on the resurrection, there's a part of the old, old story that just hit differently for me this year.

Before Jesus went to the cross, Jesus explicitly told His disciples that He

would suffer at the hands of the religious leaders, be killed, but then rise from the dead on the third day. He did this on at least three different occasions (Matt. 16:21-23, Matt. 17:22-23, & Matt. 20:17-19). We know that Jesus' claim was known beyond just His disciples because in Matthew 27, the chief priests went to Pilate and asked him to put guards at the tomb in case His disciples would try to steal His body and claim that He actually rose from the dead. So, if Jesus made the effort to give His closest followers a heads up that He would rise again, why does Matthew 28 not begin with the eleven camping out at the tomb, anticipating the dawn of the third day? Sure, the guards were there, but why not be around the corner or watching from a distance on the hillside? Instead, we see the ladies arrive at the tomb. But, they were not anticipating His resurrection either. They were there to finish anointing Jesus' dead body. And even beyond Him explicitly telling them what would happen, just days prior to the Passion Week, they had all witnessed Him raise His friend Lazarus from the dead after he had been in a tomb for 4 days! Yet, after all they had witnessed and heard, the third day dawned and there was zero anticipation



that He would rise from the dead as He told them He would. Why?

Even after three full years of following Him and being taught by Him and witnessing His miracles, is it possible that they still didn't fully grasp all that He was and is? Notice, in a few instances, Jesus's followers had an encounter with the resurrected Christ, and yet still did not know who He was. In John 20:15, Mary Magdalene mistook Him for the gardener. In John 21, some of His disciples who were fishing did not immediately recognize Him. On the road to Emmaus in Luke 24, two of His disciples didn't recognize Him until later in the day even after spending considerable time with Him. In each case, they finally recognized Him when Jesus clearly revealed Himself to them. He was the One to open their eyes to see

and their hearts to believe. Only after their encounters with the resurrected Jesus, did they fully understand.

For me, there are a couple of takeaways. First, it is certainly possible to know who Jesus was and is, and even know all that the Bible says about Him, without truly knowing Jesus in His fullness. It's possible to know all about Him, attend church regularly and listen to sermons, but still not know the life changing hope, peace, and joy that result from the resurrection. That's a scary thought to consider. If you haven't experienced true hope, the peace that doesn't make sense, and the fullness of His joy regardless of life's circumstances, I challenge you to press into Jesus and ask Him to open your eyes to everything that He is: Comforter, Joy Giver, Friend, Savior, King, and so much more! But, for those that truly know Him, do you live expecting Him to do great things in, around, and through you? Do you live expecting Him to fulfill His promises? Do you live confidently in hope? Do you live in obedience to His commands, all because of the hope of the resurrection? While Easter is a day that we rightfully and joyfully celebrate His resurrection, let us live in that hope every day, because He is forever risen!

Crooked Creek Animal Hospital feature: Spring cleaning for pets

Spring is here and it's a good time to do some spring cleaning for your dog or cat. Here are some good cleaning tips.

1. Food and water bowls. Wash the bowl with regular dish soap and hot water and give it a good scrub. If the

bowls are dishwasher safe, run them through the dishwasher after initial deep cleaning. Be sure to check for cracks in the bowls and replace when necessary.


2. Bedding. Remove bedding, blankets, covers, etc and wash them in the washing machine per instructions on the items. Be sure to dry completely to avoid mildew and mold.

3. Toys. Inspect your pet's toys to make sure they are still safe. If broken or cracked, throw the toys away and get new ones. If the toys can be washed, follow instructions on the item and give them a good washing in the washing machine or hand wash and dry completely. Be sure to follow the instructions on your washer and dryer too.

4. Kennel and crate. For an outdoor

kennel, remove all bedding, mats, toys, etc from the kennel and thoroughly clean the kennel with a pet friendly cleaning solution or disinfectant. Use a hose to rinse and spray down everything until clear from dirt and grime and chemicals from the cleaning solu-

tion or disinfectant. Let the kennel dry before letting the pet and bedding back in. For an indoor crate, remove all bedding, mats, toys, etc, from the crate and clean all surfaces with a pet friendly cleaning solution or disinfectant and rinse thoroughly. Make sure the crate is dry before letting the pet and bedding back in.


