


Pelahatchie HS brings focus to CTE Awareness month Special to Pelahatchie News

During the month of February, Pelahatchie High School along with the career and technical community takes time to honor CTE (Career and Technical Educational) programs. Career and technical education plays a vital role in college and career readiness for our students and their future. Pelahatchie High School takes pride in offering valuable CTE programs such as Computer Science, Ag & Natural Resources, Health Science, Family & Consumer Science, and Engineering.

Computer Science (taught by Kessie Key and Luke Cotnam): Exposure to computer science begins in our elementary school with Mrs. Rebecca Nelson (STEM). As

our students move into junior high (7th and 8th grades), Mrs. Key and Coach Cotnam work alongside them showing them the effectiveness of critical thinking and problem-solving in real-world situations with a focus on computers and technology. We deep dive and learn where computer science is used in their field of interest and how these core concepts of computer science can provide insight into a field of opportunity they may not have considered. Computer Science is also taught in a high school elective we offer, Exploring Computer Science. Students learn a more scoped focus of computer science concepts such as Web Design, Programming, Computing and Data

Analysis, Machine Learning, Artificial Intelligence, Robotics, and E-Textiles. For many of our students, this is an opportunity again to explore career fields they may not have ever considered prior to being exposed.

Ag & Natural Resources (Bob Robinson): This is one of our oldest onsite CTE Programs at PHS. This program has provided ample opportunities for our students to gain hands-on learning experiences and enhanced community involvement. The Ag program at PHS has attracted students from the community because we offer hands-on learning and experiences that may otherwise be missed. The students in this program learn concepts like plant care, welding,

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Rankin Deputies Seize Kilo of Cocaine Pelahatchie Library February Events

On Thursday, January 18, 2024, a deputy with the Rankin County Sheriff's Office Criminal Interdiction Team made a traffic stop on a passenger vehicle on Interstate 20 for a traffic violation. During a roadside interview, the deputy became suspicious of the discrepancies in the driver's story.

During a consensual search of the vehicle, the deputy with the assistance of his K-9 partner "Voodoo" discovered approximately one kilogram of cocaine located in the vehicle. The driver was placed under arrest.

The driver is identified as Miguel Camarillo-Alacala. The suspect was transported to the Rankin County Jail and booked on the charge of Trafficking of Controlled Substances. The preliminary investigation revealed that Miguel Camarillo-Alacala is wanted out of Brownsville, Texas for "Manufacturing and Delivering Controlled Substance/Dangerous Drugs."

District Attorney "Bubba" Bramlett will bring Miguel Camarillo-Alacala before Rankin County Court Judge David Morrow for an Initial Appearance. This investigation continues.



Top ten tips to save money on energy

4. Change your central HVAC system filter when dirty according to the manufacturers recommendations. Dirty filters can impact your home's comfort and increase your electricity bill. Make sure to change out every 30 days.

5. A one-degree increase in heating setpoint or reduction in cooling setpoint can increase energy use by 3-5%, so to save money set your HVAC unit to 78 degrees in the summer and 68 degrees in the winter.

6. Have your duct work checked for leaks. Leaks at the return, air handler, and supply can be a major contributor to high bills. Mobile homes should be checked at the grill, cross over duct, and down flow air handler, for leaks.

7. Set both the upper and lower water heater thermostats no higher than 125 degrees.

8. An electric space heater can cost more than \$100 per month to operate. Minimize their use, except for limited or temporary spot heating. Turn space heaters off when leaving a room.

9. Ensure refrigerator door seals are tight. Eliminate unnecessary refrigerators.

10. Close shades and drapes during the day to keep your home cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter.




ERA wins at tournament

Understanding meteorology and the cycles of El Nino

The science of meteorology is the study of the weather along with some things that influence it. We now understand much more

about the weather than we once did, and some pretty neat predictions have been made in the past. Such as the break in the weather, that was predicted for the D Day invasion of Normandy in 1944. The weather was so bad that the German commander took a few days off and went home for his wife's birthday. The weatherman told our generals that there would be a break for an invasion, and he was right.

Then there have been some wrong calls through the years, such as the Galveston, Texas Hurricane in September of 1900, that killed as many as 12,000 people.

El Nino means Little Boy or the Christ Child in Spanish. El Nino was originally recognized by fisher-

States. La Nina means Little Girl in Spanish. It is sometimes called a "Cold Event". La Nina periods bring below-average sea surface temperatures across the east central pacific. During a La Nina year, winter temperatures are warmer than normal in the Southwest and cooler than normal in the Northeast.

We are entering an El Nino Cycle.

All my life, and especially recently, I have heard, "One extreme follows another". If this is correct, we will go from a dry spell, to a wet and possibly a very cold winter. Previous El Nino winters have contributed to some of the coolest annual temperatures and wettest winters on record.

This is not to say that we will see record rain or temperatures, but chances are better for a cooler and wetter winter, which is much needed to help dig us out of the current drought.

I have taken time to study information and maps supplied

by the National Weather Service, that showed typical weather patterns for neutral years, and patterns for moderate to strong El Nino and La Nina years. The one thing that becomes clear, is there are patterns and cycles to our weather. It all comes down to this. The main thing I have learned, is we can't control the weather, but we know who does.

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
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ERA Patriots soccer finish regular | Health classs tarts poster campaign season, clinch playoff berth

On Wednesday, January 31st, the East Rankin Patriots Boys Soccer team completed their soccer regular season with a 2-0 win over Park Place Christian Academy, finishing with an 8-4 record. Forward Jonathan Soto finished the game

with both of the goals. Additionally, Cooper Loper and Cale Cotnam finished with one assist each. With this win, East Rankin will enter the MAIS Division II Playoffs as a #2 seed in the Central district and will face the #1 seed team from the South district in the quarter-finals. This will be the first time the Patriots have been in the playoffs since 2021.

Some of the most notable games by the Patriots include wins over Madison St. Joe, Brookhaven Academy, and Lamar School. Madison St. Joe finished 2nd in

the MAIS 5A playoffs during the 2022-23 season, with Brookhaven finishing right behind. During East Rankin's first meeting against Brookhaven, the Patriots ended Brookhaven's undefeated season in a penalty shootout with the final goal scored by Jon Riemann. If the Patriots won over Brookhaven Academy during their second meeting, that would put the Patriots in as the #1 seed in their district. Lamar School also played in the MAIS 5A playoffs, entering in as a #1 seed in the East district. East Rankin defeated Lamar 3-1, collecting their first goal within the first ten minutes.

The Patriots will square off against one of the teams from the South district in the quarter-finals on Thursday, February 8th. With East Rankin's current momentum and strong record against historically good competition, the Patriots could see themselves moving on. With quality play, the Patriots might even sneak into the championship. Look out for the East Rankin Patriots in the playoffs.

Pastor's Perspective: January Calls for a New Year's Resolution

Who are your people? Who are those closest to you? Why are they your people? I feel fortunate to have many good friends in my life. Some of those relationships span decades,

Is there a common characteristic that can be found in each of your closest relationships? For me, while a shared interest or similar life situation may have helped spark the relationship, the reason for the strong bond is far deeper than that. Deep relationships are built upon trust. In this week's edition of Milesplit Mississippi Future Stars, we are highlighting Jewel Baker of East Ranking Academy!

Baker is a sixth-grade distance runner who is already making waves in the running community. She collected two wins in her 2023 season and played a monumental role in securing East Rankin's MAIS 5A Team Title. Despite being in the sixth grade, Baker only raced two JV races and acquired a two-mile record of 13:23. Instead of dominating the middle school scene, she took to the varsity courses and ran a 20:08 in the 5000m race. At the MAIS Overall XC Meet, she placed third on the East Rankin squad and was a key factor in their victory that day. East Rankin Academy beat out Simpson Academy by two points for the team title, a feat that could not have been accomplished without Jewel Baker. Baker's talent and hard work made

her the fastest sixth-grader in the state this year, and the second fastest sixth-grader to ever touch the 5000m race in Mississippi. Outside of Mississippi, she is ranked as the fourth fastest sixth-grader in the nation for the 5000m.

Be on the lookout for Jewel Baker in the coming years, as her running career is just getting started.

Legislature completes fifth week, two special sessions

This was the fifth week of the 2024 Legislative Session. Because it is early in the session, committees are just starting to meet as bills are still being drafted, so floor action has been light. Bills must be passed out of committee before they are considered by the entire House. The deadline for bill introduction is Monday, February 19, and the deadline for bills to be out of committee is Tuesday, March 5. Despite most work still happening in committees, two bills reached the House floor.

House Bill 539 would allow presumptive eligibility for prenatal care under Medicaid for pregnant women whose household incomes are 194% below the federal poverty line. These women could receive care for 60 days while the Mississippi Division of Medicaid is reviewing their applications. A qualified provider (e.g., the Health


Department, a doctor trained in the process, etc.) would have to deem the woman eligible to receive the benefits by confirming the pregnancy and determining her income level. The bill passed the House by a vote of 117-5.

Online sports betting would become legal in Mississippi under House Bill 774, or the Mississippi Mobile Sports Wager-

ing Act. The bill would require online sportsbooks like Bet-MGM, FanDuel or DraftKings to partner with an existing casino in Mississippi. This would ensure that

money is staying at brick-

and-mortar locations. In-person sports betting at physical casinos is currently legal. Gaming Chair-

man Casey Eure (R – Saucier) introduced Amendment 1, which added that the revenue collected by the state would go towards the Emergency Road and Bridge Repair Fund, and the amendment passed on a voice vote. Representative Robert L. Johnson, III introduced Amendment 2, which would have given the gross revenue from a wager to the casino within a 40-mile radius from the placed bet instead of the casino with which the platform has partnered. Amendment 2 was tabled by a vote of 77-35. The bill passed the House by a vote of 98-14.
