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nie meet that criteria and in a very direct way. Their lives are a great encouragement to our current students, prospective students, and our alumni. We couldn't be more pleased to have them back home for homecoming and for the

Spencer, who earned a Bachelor of Arts in Sports Ministry, and Melanie, who earned a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education, have spent their lives committed to service. Married shortly after graduating, the Sullivans followed a call to minister overseas, spending 12 years in the Middle East working with unreached communities and refugees. Spencer's sports ministry and strategic mission leadership took him across 10 countries,

while Melanie worked closely with displaced families, offering compassion and support.

In 2018, the couple returned to Mississippi, continuing their commitment to service in their hometown of Pelahatchie. Melanie is a special education teacher at Pelahatchie Elementary School and is pursuing a Master of Education in Dyslexia Therapy at Mississippi College.

The Sullivans will be formally honored during Belhaven's Homecoming & Family Weekend, where they will be celebrated by fellow alumni, students, faculty, and the Belhaven community.

# Neighbors Gather in Faith at Mayor's Prayer Breakfast



The scent of bacon and fresh coffee greeted everyone who stepped into the Pelahatchie Baptist Church Fellowship Hall on Saturday morning, September 6. From the moment you walked in, you could already tell it was going to be a great breakfast—and it didn't disappoint. A thick guest book lay open at the entrance, its pages filling quickly with the names of early arrivals before they joined the lively hum of conversation and the aroma of a homecooked meal.

Mayor Karl VanHorn welcomed the crowd, which included a long list of familiar faces from across Rankin County. Among them were Michelle Adcock, Rankin County Circuit Clerk, and Steve Gaines, District 4 Supervisor for Rankin County, along with several town aldermen and other local officials who joined neighbors and church members for a morning of prayer and fellowship.

er really know what someone is going through on the inside that might shape the way they act on the outside—and that we should meet others with grace and compassion. The message, paired with her soulful delivery, earned warm applause from the audience.

The breakfast—prepared by Andy Johns, Gary Carpenter, Doyle Grissom, Eugene Pennington, and Jimmy Pace—was classic Southern comfort: hot, hearty, and served with a smile. The biscuits smothered in gravy, paired with a fresh glass of orange juice, were a personal highlight, and quickly became a favorite topic at the tables. Guests shared stories and laughter as the Fellowship Hall filled with the easy chatter of friends catching up.

Shoemaker's music set the stage for keynote speaker Rep. Lee Yancey, a member of the Mississippi House of Representatives representing the 74th District. Yancey delivered a strong, faith-based speech that asked an important question: How do we want to be remembered? Drawing from Luke 23:42—"Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom"—he reminded listeners that the way we live our lives determines the legacy we leave behind. His message of faith and reflection struck a chord with the audience and was met with warm

applause.




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

# WLBT's Walker crowned 2025 Muscadine Stomp Champ at Jubilee

Downtown Pelahatchie came alive Saturday, September 13 as residents and visitors gathered on the town square for the 2025 Pelahatchie Muscadine Jubilee, a daylong celebration of food, music, and all things muscadine. Among the day's highlights, nothing drew more cheers than the famous Muscadine Stomp—the messy, grape-squishing showdown that has become the signature event of the festival. Contestants rolled up their pants, stepped into giant barrels of muscadines, and stomped with all their might as the crowd clapped and hollered.

This year's stomp featured a lively mix of community leaders and familiar faces: Pelahatchie City Clerk Heather Pennypacker; Allayna Jolley from the Rankin County Circuit Clerk's office; Brandon Walker of WLBT; Shane Sanders, Superintendent of the Rankin County School District; Bro. Scott Walters of All Things New (Rev. 21:5); and Yusef from the Pelahatchie Maintenance Department. The friendly competition was emceed by Tom Miles, former Mississippi state representative and now Scott County Chancery Clerk, whose playful commentary kept the crowd laughing between rounds.

When the stomping was done, Brandon Walker of WLBT emerged as the 2025 Muscadine Stomp champion, edging out the field with a combination of speed, style, and sheer determi-

nation. Walker's energetic performance brought the crowd to its feet.

"I thought it was a great experience," Walker said afterward. "Being a part of this festival was a great experience. I have always been a big advocate for the local community, and I was honored to be allowed to participate—and even more honored to be picked as the winner of the 2025 Muscadine Jubilee Stomp."

The Muscadine Stomp is more than just a spectacle; it's a nod to the traditional method of grape crushing and a playful salute to the region's love of the muscadine grape. Families crowded close to watch contestants churn the fruit into juice, and children squealed as the grape juice splashed from the barrels.

The Stomp isn't just a contest it's a celebration of Pelahatchie's spirit, bringing neighbors, families, and visitors together for laughter, friendly competition, and a shared love of the town and maybe the muscadine grape. As the barrels emptied and the

cheers faded, the 2025 Muscadine Stomp reminded everyone why the Jubilee is a beloved tradition, leaving memories—and a little grape juice—lingering long after the day ended. And we're already looking forward to seeing Brandon Walker back next year to defend his crown—hopefully he keeps practicing his stomping skills between now and then!



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
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
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# Pelahatchie Library October Events PHS and ERA participate in See You At The Pole 2025

# City Beat: Mayor, Alderman meeting for Tuesday, September 2, 2025

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen held their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, September 2, 2025 at Town Hall. Mayor Karl VanHorn called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Aldermen David Gray, Eddie

Jones, and James Harrell and Alderwoman Sandra Harvey were present. Alderwoman Diane Hill was absent.

### **Department Discussions:**

**Police Department** – Discussion included the transfer of a forfeited gun into police inventory. Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Harrell seconded the motion. The motion passed 4-0 with all in favor.

Clerk – Announcements included the upcoming Mayor's Prayer Breakfast on Saturday, September 6, 2025 at 8:00 a.m. and planning for the Muscadine Jubilee on Saturday, September 13, 2025.

**Zoning** – A variance request was presented. Brian Hall requested approval to move a house onto the vacant lot where a home had previously stood. Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Harrell seconded the motion. The motion passed 4-0 all in favor.

## **New Business:**

- 1. Approval of Minutes from the August 4, 2025 meeting Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Harrell seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-1.
- 2. Approval of Payment of the Unpaid Claims Docket Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Gray seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-1.



- 3. Approval of Bank Draft Payment to Morgan and White Insurance in the amount of \$1,146.19 Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Gray seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-1.
- 4. Approval of Bank Draft Payment to Blue Cross Insurance in the amount of \$9,052.36 Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Gray seconded the motion. The motion passed 4-0 all in favor.
- 5. Approval of Bank Draft Payment to EMC In-

surance in the amount of \$6,270.81 – Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Gray seconded the motion. The motion passed 4-0 all in favor.

- 6. Approval and Ratification of Payroll for August 2025 in the amounts of General \$81,278.08 and Enterprise \$31,817.93 Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Gray seconded the motion. The motion passed 3-1.
- 7. Amendment of the 2024 Budget to Actual Alderman Jones made a motion and Alderman Gray seconded the motion. The motion passed 4-0 all in favor.

### **Discussions:**

Alderman Jones reminded everyone it was still hurricane season and reiterated everyone always stay weather aware. Mayor VanHorn stated that Entergy is continuing working with the town to repair non-functioning street lights. Tornado sirens were also discussed. Concerns were raised that the system is obsolete and would require replacement if testing failed in the future. City stated they were looking at possible grants for tornado siren upgrades.

A motion was made to adjourn at 6:22 PM by Alderman Jones and seconded by Alderwoman Harvey with all in favor. The meeting was adjourned at 6:23 p.m.

# The difference between play and responsibility: Farm safety for kids

Farming and harvest season is in full swing. Corn, cotton, and soybeans are being harvested. Workdays are long and tiring. It's not a job for

the slothful and certainly not for children.

Every year across this nation youngsters under 16 are seriously and often fatally injured due to accidents on a farm.

Although the odds of an accident may not be great, it does happen. The likelihood of a crippling injury or death is enough to make any parent do some serious thinking before they allow their child to tag along or take the wheel.

Machinery-related farming accidents tend to be among the most physically devasting. Mere flesh is no match for horsepower and cold steel. A small child's body can't withstand the weight of even a small tractor if he or she fell off

and under when riding along, or even worse, the child could fall under the implement the tractor is pulling.

Children are not miniature adults and cannot be expected to always successfully cope with situations that call for adults' foresight, judgement, experience, skill and strength, situations that we often face when farming.

Perhaps a 10-year-old can guide a tractor down a furrow, but it may

not always be that simple. Something can happen that requires a quick decision and a critically correct response.

Every farm parent must decide when their children are ready to help and what jobs are appropriate for their level of development. A lot of times the extra help is really needed to get through the bulk of the work, but there is too much risk in pushing a child into work that he or she simply isn't fully capable of doing safely.

Children are all different. Just because one child of a certain age can successfully complete the work, doesn't mean another child of the same age can do the same. We need to keep in mind that physical development may be misleading—"Big Enough" doesn't necessarily constitute "Old Enough".

Maturity, willingness to learn and take direction, the ability to focus on the task at hand, taking pride in doing a good job, and being a part of the family work force are all necessary. Children who regard driving a tractor as a time to "goof around" and have their mind on fun or games are not yet responsible enough to operate machinery. We need to make certain that young workers are properly trained for all jobs they are given and are provided with proper protective equipment. Make wise decisions in regard to your children's safety, and watch them grow up to make their own wise decisions.

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

# Local family publishes book based on daughter's journey with alopecia

Pelahatchie residents Christina and Shaun McInnish have turned a very personal journey into a published children's story that is already inspiring readers well beyond their hometown. The couple recently released The Mystery of Magical Hats: Making Alopecia Magical, One Hat at a Time on Amazon, a fairytale inspired by their 8-year-old daughter, Taylor, who has alopecia.

Taylor, a current third-grade student at Pelahatchie Elementary School, has faced alopecia—an autoimmune condition that causes hair loss—as part of her childhood experience. While the condition can be difficult for children to understand, Christina wanted to put a positive, imaginative spin on it—something that could encourage not only Taylor, but also other children


who may feel different.

"I wanted Taylor to see her story not as a limitation, but as something magical," Christina said. "This book is about showing kids that their differences can be celebrated and even turned into strengths."

Christina wrote the story as a whimsical fairytale, while her husband Shaun provided the illustrations that bring the magical hats and characters to life. The teamwork made the project a true family effort, with Taylor's journey at the center of it all.

The release of the book also comes at a meaningful time. September is Alopec

ful time. September is Alopecia Awareness Month, dedicated to raising awareness about alopecia, supporting individuals and

families affected, and advocating for research and treatment options. The McInnishes hope their book will play a small role in spreading awareness and understanding.






# Pastor's Perspective: What is the Greatest Treasure?

We've all heard the quote: "Value (or beauty) is in the eye of the beholder". Which means, of course, that

the value or worth of something varies according to the assessment of each individual. What one person believes to be extremely valuable may hold little or no value to someone else and vice versa. With that in mind, what in your life holds the most value? According to your eyes, what is the greatest treasure you can attain? It may not be something material. Maybe it is something that money can't buy. Is it a relationship? Is it love or joy or happiness or peace or rest? Or maybe it is material. Is it land, a house, a vehicle, jewels, etc.? Whatever it is, as the beholder of value, in your eyes what it is worth? Is there a price?

As the Beholder of everything, Jesus shared a couple of short parables

to communicate the value of the Kingdom of God (Heaven). They are found in Matthew 13:44-46. They go like this: "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls, who, on finding one pearl of great value, went and sold all that he had and bought it." In one case a man stumbled across a great treasure

in a field and his response was to sell and give up everything else in his life so that he could buy the field and therefore attain this great treasure. In the other parable, the merchant was searching for what seemed unattainable. It was his job to search for pearls and then resell them in order to earn a living. In his pursuit, he was always searching for the one pearl of great price, probably something he never thought he'd see. However when he did find it, his response was to sell and give up





everything else in his life in order to purchase this precious pearl of great value.

Through these parables, Jesus is communicating the value of finding the Kingdom of God. As the Creator and Beholder of all things, in this case, Jesus' valuation of the Kingdom trumps our individual perspectives of value and worth. 


