She serves as the Mississippi Foreign Languages Association's Vice-President of Membership and the Southern Conference on Language Teaching's Board of Directors as Co-Editor of SCOLTalk and Co-Registrar.


kindness and tries to help others when they need help.





City Beat: Mayor, Alderman meeting for Monday, December 1, 2025

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Pelahatchie met in regular session on Monday, December 1, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. at Town Hall. Mayor Karl VanHorn called the meeting to order, followed by the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance. A roll call was taken with

Aldermen Diane Hill, Sandra Harvey, David Gray, Eddie Jones, and James Harrell present.

Residents' and Visitors' Business:

David McKay addressed the Board regarding a water connection issue at his property located at 328 Lake Road. After discussion, the Board advised that the town would investigate the matter further and contact Mr. McKay once a solution is determined.

Department Discussions:

The Clerk noted that the town's Christmas parade is scheduled to take place on Saturday, December 6, 2025. Zoning matters involving 13 properties were discussed.

New Business:

- 1. The Board discussed and considered approval of the minutes from the Regular Board Meeting held on November 3, 2025. A motion was made by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman James Harrell to approve the minutes, and the motion passed unanimously.
- 2. The Board then considered approval of the minutes

from the Public Hearing held on November 18, 2025. A motion was made by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman David Gray, and the motion passed unanimously.

- 3. The Board next discussed the unpaid claims docket. A motion was made by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman David Gray to approve the unpaid claims docket, and the motion passed unanimously.
- 4. The Board then considered a bank draft payment to Morgan and White Insurance in the amount of \$1,114.23, secondary to BCBS. A motion was made



by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman Diane Hill and the motion passed unanimously.

- 5. The Board also considered a bank draft payment to EMC Insurance in the amount of \$6,509.53 for property insurance. A motion was made by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman Harrell, and the motion passed unanimously.
- 6. The Board then discussed a bank draft payment to Blue Cross Insurance in the amount of \$9,862.28. A motion was made by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman Diane Hill, and the motion passed unanimously.

7. The Board next discussed and considered approval and ratification of payroll for November 2025, including General payroll in the amount of \$72,416.95 and Enterprise payroll in the amount of \$31,630.36. A motion was made by Alderman Eddie Jones and seconded by Alderman Harrell, and the motion carried 3-2 with Alderman Hill and Alderman Harvey voting nay.

A motion was then made by Alderman Jones to amend the agenda at 6:17 PM to add Waggoner Engineering to the agenda. The motion was seconded by Alderman Harrell. Hayden Overby with Waggoner Engineering made a recommendation that the Board reject all current bids for the town's wastewater project. Alderman Jones made the motion, Alderman Gray seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Alderman Discussions:

Alderman Diane Hill reported potholes located at 311 North Avenue and 304 North Avenue. Alderman Eddie Jones stated the town had a good year and expressed hope that everyone would have a great holiday season. Mayor VanHorn reported that a plate glass window at the front of City Hall was damaged and would require replacement at an estimated cost of \$14,700, which includes glass and installation. In addition, Mayor VanHorn announced that Pancakes with Santa would be held on Saturday, December 6, 2025 from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m., and that the town Christmas parade would follow afterwards at 10:00 a.m.

There being no further business, a motion to adjourn was made by Alderman Diane Hill and seconded by Alderman Eddie Jones. The meeting adjourned at 6:25 p.m.




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

Misused or damaged lithium batteries can lead to fire or explosion

Battery powered equipment, leaf blowers, weed eaters, chain saws, and cordless drills are gaining in popularity. These devices are powered by lithium batteries. Their

popular use is due to this battery's high-power capacity, in a relatively small package.


There are several different types of lithium batteries, some rechargeable and some non-rechargeable, both of which are generally safe and unlikely to fail but only so long as there are no defects or damage.

When lithium batteries fail to operate safely or are damaged, they present a fire or explosion hazard. Damage can occur immediately or over a period of time.


There are different ways that lithium batteries can be damaged:

- Improper use, storage, or charging.
- Physical impacts, such as dropping, crushing, or puncturing.
- Exposure to extreme temperatures. Temperatures above 130 degrees F., open flames, continuous direct

sun exposure, exposure to heaters, etc., can damage these batteries. Below freezing temperatures, during charging, can also lead to a damaged lithium battery.



Lithium battery fires are extremely difficult to extinguish. Fire extinguishers

Any of these can result in cell failure, releasing intense heat and damaging other nearby cells causing a chain reaction known as a thermal runaway. The high energy density in lithium batteries makes them more susceptible to these reactions. Lithium cell failures can result in chemical and/or combustion reactions, which can result in heat release and/or combustion reactions, which can

may only temporarily knock the flames down and large amounts of water are often ineffective. Lithium fires usually re-ignite and have to burn out before they are no longer a threat. Isolating the burning object from other flammable material is often the only way to prevent the spread of a lithium battery fire. Prevention steps to help prevent a lithium battery fire are:

1. Ensure lithium battery's chargers, and associated equipment, are a high-quality product (recognized by national testing standards; ex. UL).

2. Always store, use and maintain by the manufacturer's recommendations.

3. When replacing lithium batteries, always ensure they are specifically designed for and match the device.

4. Remove lithium-powered devices and batteries from the charger once they are fully charged.


5. Store lithium-powered devices and batteries and devices in dry cool locations.

6. Clean lithium batteries with a clean, slightly damp cloth. Do not use solvents.

7. Inspect lithium batteries for signs of damage, such as bulging and cracking or rising temperature.

8. If lithium batteries are damaged, leaking or smoking, remove them from service and isolate them from everything else. For example, smaller batteries can be placed outside in a fire-resistant container, such as a metal drum.

Pastor's Perspective: Grace Found in the Vineyard

This may seem a bit odd coming from a Southern Baptist pastor, but I love visiting wineries and vineyards. To be clear, I haven't been to very many. But, our family formerly lived on the island of Cyprus for 7 years and though it is a small country, it is home to several

vineyards, which produce local wines. Just a couple of months ago, we were in the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina for a wedding, and we were able to visit a vineyard there as well. The vineyards I've had the pleasure of visiting are beautiful places. There are rows and rows of grape vines growing across terraced hills as far as you can see. It's a breathtaking sight. But, as I take in the beauty of all that I see, I begin to consider the manpower and hard work that is behind it all. It must take loads of hardworking people to build and nurture these vineyards which produce the beautiful grape vines.

One day, Jesus told a story and a vineyard happened to be the setting. I encourage you to take a few moments to read it. You can find it at the beginning of Matthew 20. In this story, the owner of the vineyard went into town to hire workers 5 different times over the course of a day. In our time living in the Middle East, I can remember each city having a specific location where day laborers would gather and wait, tools in hand, ready to be hired for a job. This was obviously a common scene in Jesus' day as well. The owner first went out early in the morning. For the first group

he hired, he agreed with each worker for a denarius for the day's work. A denarius was the daily wage for a soldier. A day laborer never would have expected this much, which communicates that the owner was quite generous. Each of the subsequent 4 times he went out to hire workers, he told them: "You go into the vine-yard too, and whatever is right I will give you." At the end of the day, he instructed his foreman to deliver the wages to each worker, starting with those that were hired on last. Each were given a denarius, which of course, was the original amount agreed upon with the first group of workers. Therefore, when the first workers saw the amount, they got really excited. Of course, you know what they were thinking: if those guys got

a denarius, how much are we going to get? Yet, when the foreman paid out all the wages, they all got the same amount: I denarius. Clearly, this frustrated those who had been hired first. Why? Because they didn't think the owner had been "fair". They had worked for far longer, but got the same amount as those that worked less. Let's be honest. How would you have responded? My guess is we all would have been a bit salty. We're conditioned to think a certain way about what's fair and what's not. But listen again to the owner's response: "Friend, I am doing you no wrong. Did you not agree with me for a denarius? Take what belongs to you and go. I choose to give to this last worker as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or do you begrudge my generosity?"

In Jesus' story, the owner of the vineyard is God. The vineyard is the Kingdom of God. The workers are believers. And finally, the denarius is the gift of eternal life. There is a lot that we could take away from this story, including how we determine what is "fair" and "unfair". But, if we really want God to be "fair", then we would all eternally burn. Instead, consider this. God, out of His immeasurable generosity, gives the same abundant grace to everyone who follows Jesus. Some come to faith early in life and serve Him for a lifetime. Others turn to Him in their final moments, perhaps even after a life of rebellion. However, His grace is the same for all. This is a beautiful truth. The question is, have you believed and received His grace and the gift of eternal life? Don't wait and take the chance on tomorrow. Receive His abundant grace and know the joy of the Lord today!

Board of Education seeks HS sophomores as representatives

The Mississippi State Board of Education (SBE) is seeking applications from high school sophomores to serve as the new high school junior student representative on the SBE for the 2026-27 school year. The application deadline is January 30, 2026.

Now in its eighth year, the Student Representatives of the Mississippi State Board of Education program includes a high school junior and a high school senior who serve as non-voting SBE members to share their viewpoints on policy decisions regarding Mississippi public schools.

The current SBE junior representative, Michelle Xie of Oak Grove High School, will serve as the senior representative in 2026-27. Through a competitive process, the SBE will appoint a new junior representative to serve a two-year term starting July 1, 2026.

The top ten semi-finalists among applicants, including the junior representative appointed and an alternate representative, automatically get to serve on the State Superintendent's Student Advisory Council. There were thirty students who were eligible applicants for the 2025-26 junior representative



osition.

The SBE adopted policy in 2018 outlining criteria for adding student representatives to the State Board. Student representatives are responsible for attending monthly SBE meetings and any standing committees or subcommittees to which they are assigned. They are excused from school to attend SBE meetings as official school business, and they also work as liaisons for their peers to SBE.

The application packet must be mailed and postmarked by January 30, 2026, and a video component of the application must be uploaded that day by 5 p.m. To access the application, visit MDEK12.org/mbe/Student-Representatives-Of-The-Mississippi-State-Board-Of-Education/.
